

Biblical Teachers in the Faculty of Theology from Belgrad

Abstract

Professor Dr. Dimitrie Stefanovici was born on 31 July 1882, in Zmaievo. He graduated the Gymnasium in Novi Sad. After secondary school, he enrolled in Theological Seminary from Karlowitz, and has completed graduate studies at the Faculty of Orthodox Theology of the University of Cernauti. In 1907 "performed some heavy exams and was promoted to Doctor of Theology" at the Faculty of Cernauti. From 1907 to 1920, he taught Scripture of the New Testament and Greek at the Theological Seminary from Karlowitz and from 1920 until 1922 was professor of New Testament at the Faculty of Orthodox Theology of the University of Zagreb. On October 3, 1921, he was elected professor at the same department at the Faculty of Orthodox Theology in Belgrade where he remained professor until 1943 when it will be retired. Professor Dr. Emilian Ciarnici was born on November 28, 1914, in Ciacova. After the end of World War I in 1921, when Emilian received Serbian citizenship, along with his parents he left Romania and settled in the territory of Yugoslavia. He graduated General School in Țrepaia. He graduated high school in 1932 in Pancevo. In the same year, he enrolled at the Faculty of Theology in Belgrade, which he graduated in 1936. He followed studies of classical languages at the Faculty of Philology in Belgrade, which he graduated in 1942. In 1947, the Board of the Faculty of Theology in Belgrade elected him assistant in Greek, but he began teaching in 1949. Immediately after his return to Athens in the summer of 1954, Ciarnici is appointed Lecturer in the Faculty of Orthodox Theology, Department of New Testament and Greek. In 1973, he was advanced to the rank of professor, where he remained until 1977 when he retired. Professor Dr. Dusan Glumatz was born on October 17, 1899 in Târniani, Slavonia, parents John (an economist) and Efimia born Vukotic. He started the education at

that school in 1905 and ending in 1910. Then he graduated from high school in the same town in 1918. He was enrolled at the Theological Seminary in Sremski Karlovic in the fall of 1918, he graduated in 1921. After returning from Germany, on October 18, 1925, the Board of the Faculty of Theology in Belgrade chose him assistant professor of Old Testament and Biblical Archaeology. On June 4, 1926, he was elected Lecturer in Hebrew. At the end of 1945, he was elected chair of the Old Testament as a teacher. In 1945, he was elected in the position of dean of the Faculty of Theology, and in 1948 the position of Dean of the same Faculty. After the Faculty of Theology was excluded from the University of Belgrade, he was transferred to the Faculty of Philosophy at the same university, the Department of Archaeology (1955), where he remained until he retired. Professor Dr. Milos Erdelian was born on December, 12th, 1907 in Deva, Romania, the parents Milan (Emil) and Anna. Erdelian was an old Serbian family very religious and respected, in which there were born several priests. Four grades of primary school and secondary school he graduated in the school of St. Andrei with great results. He graduated in 1927 Karlovic Sremski Theological Seminary with excellent results, and the Faculty of Theology, University of Belgrade in 1931 also with excellent results. In December 1935, Milos was elected by the Teaching Council in position of assistant in the Old Testament. He was elected in the position of Lecturer in 1943. He enjoyed a major respect from teachers, peers who elected him several times in the positions of dean and vice-dean of the Faculty of Theology in Belgrade.
